Arkansas Tornado Update

A tornado touched down last Sunday night, April 27, in north central Arkansas. **Gary DiGiuseppe** (Arkansas Radio Network, Little Rock, AR) said, "Among the hardest hit communities were Vilonia and Mayflower in Faulkner County, north of Little Rock. The county recorded 10 fatalities. It was three years and one day after another tornado had struck Vilonia." Gary reports that University of Arkansas Extension staff chair for Faulkner County Hank Cheney told him, "A lot of people who had damage, had just finished rebuilding and were getting their lives back." May 2014 Reflections

Mike Orso (Director of News & Communications, RFD Radio Network, Bloomington, IL) offered his reflections on the recent passing of Jack Crowner (NAFB Past President, Louisville, KY). Mike said, "I recall a photo NAFB published, sometime within the last five years or so, of Jack still working in his studio, complete with open reel recorders, cart machines and a manual or electric typewriter, among other things. It was like a 1970s/early 80s radio studio frozen in time! I thought, 'Wow, that ought to be preserved somewhere as an example of the tools used for farm radio in the late 20th Century.'" Mike added, "I remember when I worked for the American Farm Bureau, and we provided video services at the AFBF Convention for Jack and other farm broadcasters who wanted some video for TV back home. The videographer and grip set up and asked Jack for a mic check. His response with that big, booming voice: 'You don't have to worry about MY audio levels!'"

EDITOR'S NOTE: My first memory of Jack was as President of NAFB in 1970 when I attended the final NAFB Convention held in Chicago, IL.
